
# **CADC Exam Preparation**

#### **Addictions Counselor Certification**

- A certificate, not a license (CADC)
- Issued through the <u>Illinois Certification Board</u>
- Requires 3 Es: Education, Experience, & Exam
- 40 CEUs every two years + re-certification fee to maintain



### **Application Information**

#### Use the <u>COD application</u>, NOT the one online

- Complete the needed pages and mail to Springfield with a check
- The Illinois Certification Board will contact you about setting up the actual test date, which is a separate fee
- College of DuPage is one of the approved testing sites
- Expect approx. 6 weeks between applying and testing

#### **Test Basics**

100 multiple choice questions

- 78 correct is passing
- Two-hour time limit
- Taken on a computer
- Score shows once submitted
- Can be taken any time of year



#### **Exam Content Areas**

- 1. Clinical Evaluation --- 16 questions
- 2. Treatment Planning --- 11 questions
- 3. Counseling --- 15 questions
- 4. Case management & referral --- 22 questions
- 5. Documentation --- 14 questions
- 6. Client, family, & community education --- 8 questions
- 7. Professional ethics --- 14 questions

\* In 2018, the two lowest scoring areas for COD students were case management & documentation (73 & 76%)

#### **Sample Clinical Evaluation Question**

#### FAQs

#### When should I take the exam?

- After coursework is done
- During or just after internship is ideal

#### How much does it cost?

Fee to apply, to test, and to certify
\$75, \$175, \$135 = \$385 total

#### What if I don't pass?

- You will pass
- You can re-apply after two weeks



### **Preparation Tips**

#### Read the study guide

- Take the test at a time when you aren't rushed and you are normally alert (for most people, this is in the AM)
- Get sleep the night before the test
- Stick to your normal routine the day of the exam

# **Test-Taking Strategies**

### Your best mental game

#### Stay <u>calm and focused</u>

- Read the ENTIRE question
- Eliminate wrong answers
- Choose the best answer
- Answer all questions (no penalty for guessing)
- Questions are based on common practice among counselors
- Ignore everyone else

### Your best physical game

Take the test at a time when you will be alert and rested Wear something comfortable and non-disruptive Arrive early so you're not rushing Use the bathroom before testing Take a brief break during the test (rest your eyes, stretch, etc.)

#### After the test

Congratulate yourself for finishing
 A non-passing score is not a huge deal
 Do something you enjoy

## Treatment Planning, Client Rights, & Case Management

### **Treatment Planning**

Discuss assessment & recommendations

Develop a collaborative plan with mutual goals

Review the plan and modify as needed

Involve family in plan if appropriate

#### **Document**

- Problem
- Goal
- Objective
- Methods (actions)
- Signatures

SMART Goals Specific Measureable Achievable Realistic Time-limited

### **Client Rights**

- Right to individual dignity
- Right to confidentiality
- Right to non-discriminatory services
- Right to quality services
- Right to communication
- Right to personal effects
- Right to education for minors
- Right to counsel

### **Case Management**

#### Four Elements:

- 1. Continuity of care
- 2. Accessibility
- 3. Accountability
- 4. Efficiency



#### **Principles of Case Management**

Advocate for better client care

- Connect the client with community resources
- Develop networks
- Provide the client with options
- Focus on meeting client needs
- Keep an open mind and be flexible

### **Case Management & Referral**

- EVERY client gets a referral
- Appropriate, accessible, & culturally sensitive
- 🧕 Plan ahead

CLIENT PROBLEM	REFERRAL
Grief, anger, trauma	Licensed therapist (social worker, counselor)
Health concerns, pain	Physician, health department
Legal issues	Legal counsel (Prairie State Legal Services, DuPage Legal Aid)
Homelessness	Transitional housing, shelter
Lack of sober support	Self-help meetings (12-step or SMART)
Unemployment	Career services (DuPage PADS, Worknet DuPage)



# Court Mandated Drug Treatment Probation, TASC, and Drug Courts

#### Probation



- Client receives a sentence for a criminal case
- Assigned to be monitored by a probation officer
- Might require drug testing, treatment, and 12-step meetings
- Generally less supervision than TASC & Drug Court
- Wide range of offenses, many involving drug use or possession

#### T.A.S.C.

- Treatment Alternatives for Safe Communities
- Form of probation
- Client has a probation officer and a TASC case manager
- Must be approved by <u>TASC</u>
- Crimes are directly related to drug use
- Client must enter treatment
- TASC monitors client for approximately one year
- Served over 15,000 adults in Illinois in 2014

### Drug Court

- More supervision, more requirements
- Mostly felony cases (some accept DUIs)
- Client signs a contract with the court and a team of support people
- Required to complete drug treatment
- Following treatment... Court weekly, drug tests, meet with case manager, find employment, and pay restitution
- Monitored for two years or more
- Completion of the program advation & current charges dropped

#### **Confidentiality Issues**

- Criminal justice system openly shares most client information
- Treatment centers still must follow confidentiality requirements
- Communication between treatment program and probation or court requires client consent



#### **Clinical Issues**

Housing Recidivism (return to criminal behavior) Relapse **Employment & Education** Transportation Lack of family support **Medical problems** Mental health problems

#### Does Legal Pressure Work?

- <u>40-50%</u> of treatment referrals are from the criminal justice system
- Court referrals = detention and completion rates
- Internal motivation is still a significant factor

### Comparison of Requirements

#### **Probation**

- Least restrictive
- Assigned a probation officer
- May require treatment
- Conviction but no prison

#### TASC

- Probation + case manager
- Requires treatment
- Approximately one year
- Conviction but no prison

#### **Drug Court**

- Most restrictive
- Always requires treatment
- High level of monitoring
- Long-term (usually 2 years+)
- No conviction if completed
