Johnson's texts reveal governing style and intrigue at Chicago City Hall

The text from Chicago Mayor Brandon Johnson started as his messages often do.

"Yo!" he wrote AJL Daniel La Spata, let, last month.

The Northwest Side alderman knew what it meant. "That's when I called him," he remembered.

A Tribune review of Johnson's text messages show many politicians have gotten similar messages and read between those two letters themselves.

The mayor's exchanges with aldermen, Gov. JB Pritzker, top business officials and labor leaders show he is more reluctant than predecessors Lori Lightfoot and Rahm Emanuel to put much in writing. While Lightfoot would often respond to text messages with voluminous answers that sometimes bordered on venomous, Johnson usually replies with a phone call or directs his staff to return the message.

The sea change may also be a sign of the times, as politicians are increasingly wary of sending electronic communications that are subject to public records requests.

In 2018, the Tribune won a lawsuit against the Emanuel administration over his failure to turn over records from personal devices and accounts that he used to conduct city business, a ruling that curtailed Illinois politicians

'We are terrified'

ICE begins long-promised immigration blitz in Chicago

It was around 8 a.m. Sunday when a family friend called Maria to ask why her husband of nearly 10 years hadn't shown up for work.

Minutes later, with federal immigration agents banging on the front door of her apartment in Chicago's Hermosa neighborhood, she had an answer.

Maria's husband was one of an as-yet-unknown number of people taken into custody Sunday morning in what appeared to be the opening salvo in the long-promised — and much-feared — federal immigration blitz on Chicago.

U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement spokesman Jeff Carter issued a statement Sunday saying that ICE and partner federal agencies "began conducting enhanced targeted operations today in Chicago to enforce U.S. immigration law and preserve public safety and national security by keeping potentially dangerous (criminals) out of our communities."

ICE announced it had arrested 1,000 people nationwide Sunday, but a spokesperson declined to say how many were from the Chicago area. Last year, the Biden administration averaged about 100 immigration arrests per day.

Chicagoans and advocates for undocumented immigrants reported at least a half-dozen ICE raids across the city and suburbs Sunday.

"One raid is one too many, regardless of where it takes place," read a statement Sunday from a

coalition of immigration advocacy organizations.

Raids disrupt communities, sow fear, separate families

The operations were carried out with two top Trump administration officials in Chicago. The

Drug Enforcement Administration's Chicago field office posted pictures on X of Deputy Attorney General Enoh Beve and "border czar" Tom Homan meeting with federal agents Sunday morning.

HOW TO PREPARE FOR UNANNOUNCED VISITS FROM ICE OR HOMELAND SECURITY



MOST IMPORTANT -
Train public-facing staff
regarding what to do if ICE
agents show up
unannounced



Prepare and provide to
staff an Emergency Phone
Tree Contact List of Upper
Management and outside
counsel



KEY - Tell staff to have
ICE agents WAIT while
calling management

HOW TO PREPARE - UNANNOUNCED SITE VISITS

- When federal agents first arrive:
 - ❖ FIRST, be polite and cordial, and present a calm and reassuring presence. Convey willingness to cooperate. Do not chat with the ICE/HSI Agent, especially about anything related to a warrant, students, employees or company policies
 - ❖ Ask to see the ICE/HSI Agent's credentials (Official identification- typically a badge or business card). If a badge, write down the name, title and phone number of the ICE/HSI Agent that is listed on the credentials. Make a copy of the business card
 - ❖ Write down the time the ICE/HSI Agent first arrived on the site. Have the ICE/HSI Agent state the nature, purpose and scope of the visit



HOW TO PREPARE - UNANNOUNCED SITE VISITS

- FIRST call College of DuPage's Office of General Counsel:
 - ❖ SRC 3110, Inquiry Line 630-942-3335
 - ❖ Next option, call President's Office, SRC 2135, 630-942-2200
 - ❖ Have public-facing staff call the "Emergency Phone Tree List" immediately



HOW TO PREPARE - UNANNOUNCED SITE VISITS

- What to know about warrants and subpoenas:
 - ❖ If a valid warrant or subpoena is presented, make a copy and ask the ICE/HSI Agent to wait while this is reviewed by the Office of General Counsel and outside counsel
 - ❖ Laner Muchin attorneys are prepared and available to assist with urgent calls to review warrants or subpoenas and will be able to advise regarding the appropriate next steps to be taken

HOW TO PREPARE - UNANNOUNCED SITE VISITS

- Warrants and Subpoenas (cont'd):
 - Institutions/Organizations have the right to refuse or reschedule a search of premises **IF ICE/HSI DOES NOT PRESENT** a criminal or civil search warrant or subpoena
 - Institutions/Organizations have the right to ask the agents to wait in order to review the warrant or subpoena to determine the scope, which can include a search of the premises, interviews or arrests of individuals
 - If an arrest warrant is presented, Institutions/Organizations can remind individuals that they have the right to remain silent without an attorney present

HOW TO PREPARE - UNANNOUNCED SITE VISITS

**ADMINISTRATIVE
ARREST WARRANTS** will be signed by ICE or DHS, typically for arrest of an individual. Agents should NOT be allowed entry

**JUDICIAL SEARCH
WARRANTS** will be signed by a judge -- typically covering search and seizure of property. These are broader. Agents should be allowed entry **IF** entry is covered in warrant

U.S. District Court listed across the top

Typically covers search and/or seizure of property

More broad- should be allowed entry IF entry is covered in warrant. This should be decided in conjunction with legal counsel.

Check for signature from a judge

Know Your Rights When Interacting with Immigration Officers:



KNOW YOUR RIGHTS WHEN INTERACTING WITH IMMIGRATION OFFICERS (ICE)

- If you believe you are witnessing ICE activity, please call ICIRR's 24-Hour Family Support Hotline at 1-855-HELP-MY-FAMILY (1-855-435-7693) to report it.
- If you find yourself interacting with an ICE officer in any location including your workplace, or out in the community, remember that you:
 - Have the right to remain silent when questioned or arrested by immigration officers
 - Should remain calm and keep your hands where the officer can see them
 - **DO NOT:**
 - Discuss your immigration or citizenship status with the police, immigration agents, or other officials
 - Sign anything you do not understand. You should state that you wish to speak with an attorney
- If an officer knocks on your door at home: Do NOT open the door. Teach your children not to open the door.
 - ICE officers must have a **warrant signed by a judge** to enter your home. ICE "warrants" are not signed by judges; they are ICE forms signed by ICE officers and they do not grant authority to enter your home without your consent
- If you are outdoors and think you see immigration officers nearby:
 - Move to a safe indoor space
 - If you are a U.S. citizen and feel safe to do so, record the activity with your phone or write down any relevant information about what you witness—ALWAYS being careful to not interfere or otherwise obstruct the operation
 - **DO NOT:**
 - Post unverified information on social media
 - Interfere with the investigation or otherwise put yourself in harm's way

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS WHEN INTERACTING WITH IMMIGRATION OFFICERS (ICE)

Establish a safety plan that your family can use if ICE arrests you. Key parts of a safety plan include:

- Identify your emergency contacts and memorize their phone numbers.
- Provide your child's school or daycare with an emergency contact to pick up your child.
- Provide authorization in writing for your emergency contact to make medical and legal decisions for your child.
- Tell your loved ones that if you are detained by ICE, they can try to use ICE's online detainee locator to find you: [locator.ice.gov](https://locator.ice.dhs.gov)
- If you are detained, it is important that you seek legal representation. Call 1-855-435-7693 to connect with an immigration attorney.

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Trust Act

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS



YOU HAVE CONSTITUTIONAL RIGHTS

DO NOT OPEN THE DOOR if an immigration agent is knocking on the door.

DO NOT ANSWER ANY QUESTIONS from an immigration agent if they try to talk to you. You have the right to remain silent.

DO NOT SIGN ANYTHING without first speaking to a lawyer. You have the right to speak with a lawyer.

If you are outside of your home, ask the agent if you are free to leave and if they say yes, leave calmly.

Some things you can say

I do not wish to speak with you, answer your questions, or sign or hand you any documents based on my 5th Amendment rights under the United States Constitution.

I do not give you permission to enter my home based on my 4th Amendment rights under the United States Constitution unless you have a warrant to enter, signed by a judge or magistrate with my name on it that you slide under the door.

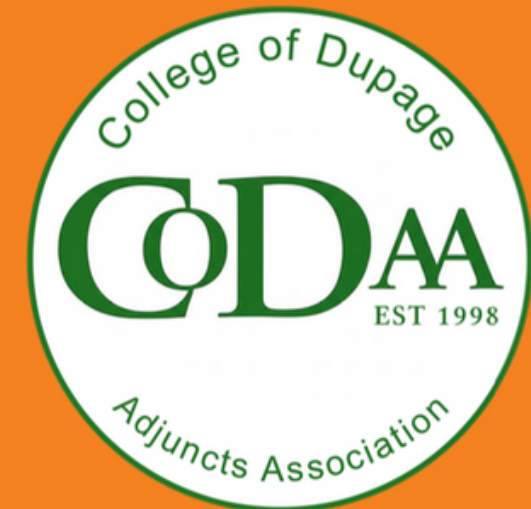
I do not give you permission to search any of my belongings based on my 4th Amendment rights.

I choose to exercise my constitutional rights.
